

The cold weather has certainly kept people close to the warmth of home, with the VIO being fairly quiet this last month. It still seems to be worth the effort of opening on Saturday mornings for those who are around.

In the background, we have been busy with other things. We are applying for a historic grant to repair, mount and hopefully frame a map of the township which Colin Germein gave us. It is a very interesting piece of history and well worth preserving. Fingers crossed we win that grant.

Also in the planning stages is the Vincent Vitality event. We now have 24 confirmed organisations, groups or individuals attending on Saturday, Oct 21<sup>st</sup> in the Port Vincent Town Hall for this free event (Refer page 5 for additional details).

We are very grateful to those who have given up their time to inform us all of what is available out there for each and every one of us, to allow us to keep connected and supported in whatever age bracket we might land.

We are very excited to have Wendy Hall of Dementia Doulas International <a href="https://www.dementiadoulas.com.au/">https://www.dementiadoulas.com.au/</a> coming to speak, and to answer any questions you might have about supporting someone through their journey of dementia. This isn't something we've had on SYP, and some support as well as education could be vital to those who are on this journey. Check out the website, as not only do they support those in a voluntary capacity, but there are training opportunities for those within the health system to gain a better understanding of how to support people with dementia. Wendy is an experienced RN who moved into the area of paramedics, then into dementia counselling. She has written various books to assist people, so her experience and understanding makes it well worth coming along to listen and speak one to one to help you or a friend on this journey.

We also have RN and Stoma specialist nurse, Tim Garfield, with all the information and support options for those with a stoma – a very confronting time for anyone going through bowel cancer or any of the various health issues which result in having a stoma.

We are looking to have some presenters who are not the usual speakers and visitors at days like this. Often SYP gets a bit left behind when it comes to such services. There will be those groups and organisations who can help with all sorts of issues not just related to health. Ever wanted to join a group and found it just too hard to walk in by yourself? This is the perfect opportunity to meet with those who can ease that concern.

Looking forward to seeing you all there on Oct 21<sup>st</sup>. Let your friends know – it is more for locals than tourists, so come and see what we've got to share with you.





Well, winter is well and truly with us, and it has brought with it the annual bloodworm run. I take my hat off to the hardy souls who braved the near freezing conditions to gather them. They are a great bait, and you deserve all the fish you catch with them.

The King George Whiting are on the improve, both north and south of Port Vincent. They are in prime condition, and you don't have to measure many.

Squid are also plentiful, both from boat and wharf, and some are monsters!

There are still tommies at the wharf, but they are mostly small. Mullet are still around the cemetery area.

There are schools of salmon in the area, but mostly around Sheoak Flat beach. They are taking lures.

I have not noticed any work being done on the damaged jetty, but I suppose we are only a small country town that probably votes the wrong way.




# A walk from Glaciers to Tropical Seas at Port Vincent

When you walk along the nature trail to the north of the marina, you're traversing approximately 300 million years of earth history from glaciers to tropical seas!

You can see evidence of an ancient glaciation on the beach north of the marina at low tide. 300 million years ago, Australia was part of a vast ice-covered supercontinent called Gondwanaland which was gripped by an ice age that lasted 100 million years. On what is now Fleurieu Peninsula, glaciers carved deep 'U-shaped' valleys and carried the eroded debris towards Yorke Peninsula. Geologists have deduced the direction of ice movement from striated and polished bedrock surfaces at places like Hallett Cove and Glacier Rock.

### **The Erratics**

Three large granite boulders on the beach north of the marina are known as erratics because they are different from the rocks seen around Pt Vincent, and do not fit Yorke Peninsula geology. If you continue to walk north along the beach, you'll see many more erratics exposed at low tide on the beach. The type of rock and direction of ice movement provide evidence that these erratics were transported by glaciers from exposed granites in what is now the Murray River region, over 120km away. Similar erratics can also be seen on beaches in Waterloo Bay, including enormous 'whale back' granite boulders.




# **Port Vincent Erratics (continued)**

Once the melted ice, extensive coal swamps developed in central and eastern Australia, but here a long period of erosion occurred, and there's a gap on the rock record. Around 160 million years ago, Gondwanaland broke up. Australia separated from Antarctica and started drifting north - a journey that still continues today.

The cliffs above the nature trail are made of Rogue Formation and Pt Vincent Limestone, which were deposited in ancient seas 10-30 million years ago. Back then, most of Yorke Peninsula was under the sea, and the Mt Lofty Ranges were covered by rainforest. The contact between the glacial rocks and the limestone represents a break in the geological record of about 240 million years - such a break is known as an unconformity.

The Rogue Formation is poorly exposed, but consists of marine sandstones and silicified layers with fossil molluscs. It is overlain by the buff-coloured Pt Vincent Limestone which was deposited Oligocene-Miocene between 10-30 million years ago. The Pt Vincent Limestone consists of layers of sandy fossiliferous limestone and silty limestone deposited in a shallow sea. Geologists have studied outcrops and fossils around the state to reconstruct the geography. and, as the map shows, it was very different back then. Yorke Peninsula was mostly under the sea, and the Mount Lofty Ranges were covered with rainforest. Fossils, best seen on the beach in the boulders of Pt Vincent Limestone, show evidence of the rich marine life that used to live in the ancient tropical sea. Fossils include bryozoa (marine moss animals that form lacy colonies), rare sea urchins, coralline algae, lampshells and molluscs.

The cliffs are capped by sand from 1.8 million years ago through to modern day, clays, and the white limestone soil nodules (calcrete) which occur over much of Yorke Peninsula. The calcrete nodules were used to build local houses, walls and farm fences. Mining occurred between 1890-1950 when the nodules were burnt in kilns on Yorke Peninsula to make lime which was bagged and transported by ketches to Adelaide for use in building mortar.

The cliffs have slumped in places, causing the hilly topography and benches on the nature trail.

The Narungga People continue to play an active role in caring for their Country, and you can read their interpretation of these boulders by the Marina Lookout.

# Narungga July news

Standout announcements this month included the allocation of \$3.04 million from the South Australian Boating Facilities Fund to upgrade the Marion Bay boat ramp, and the investment in 24/7 security guards at Wallaroo and Port Pirie hospitals. The safety of staff and patients at regional hospitals must be paramount over all other considerations.

Another recent highlight was the announced action plan to scrap the current 100 km/hr default speed limit on our beaches to a safer 40 km/hr, and down further to 25 km/hr around pedestrians. Constituents wishing to share their views on this proposal are welcome to make contact.

At time of writing today, school has resumed for term 3 and coinciding is the mandated banning of mobile phones in all classrooms of SA's 158 public secondary schools. More than 130 high schools had already introduced the ban earlier in the year but now the state-wide ban applies, the rules being that all public high school students must switch their devices off or onto flight mode and put them away during school hours, during break times and on school excursions. The roll out of this widely welcomed policy was supported through the State Budget with \$515,000 allocated to assist schools with practical requirements such as pouches, lockers, and other infrastructure to successfully implement this policy. (It is noted that principals can approve individual student exemptions in specific circumstances).


Whilst Parliament has risen for the winter break, the committee work continues behind the scenes. I have been appointed to two Select Committees - one looking at the development and deployment of Artificial Intelligence and potential economic, social and ethical implications; and the other investigating the Legalisation of Medicinal Cannabis. I encourage constituents with any views on these topics to contact me at the electorate office. For terms of reference and further information visit www.fraserellis.com.au

#### Grants

Grant programs currently open include the Regional Capability Fund for Farm Firefighting Units (Round 2 closes 4 August); the \$5 million Enabling Infrastructure Program for regional projects; and the soon to open (31 July) Round 2 of the South Australian Tourism Commission's \$2 million Experience Nature Tourism Fund.

Of the latter, grants of between \$10,000 to \$50,000 are available for new and improved nature-based tourism products or experiences in or near a national park or reserve and eligible applicants include private sector businesses, non-profit organisations and community associations. 
# **DID YOU KNOW??**

It's not a question of IF another major breach of personal data will happen, but WHEN. So what can you do to protect yourself, and what action can you take if you think your data has been compromised?

The personal data obtained in these types of hacks is commonly your name, date of birth, address, email

Now, if you've ever applied for credit, those details will sound familiar. Finance companies utilise these to access your credit report to assess your credit risk. Unlike in the past where you may have put on your Sunday best and gone to your bank to apply for a loan, now it's possible to put these details into an online application that can be approved without even leaving your home. A thief using your identity can open multiple accounts with online lenders, and have destroyed your credit rating before you even know it's happened.

How do you protect yourself:-

- 1. **Bank & Super Accounts** set up two factor authentication. This is where anyone accessing your account online must enter a code that is sent to the owner of the account before access is granted. This is often done by SMS (the bank sends you a text with a six digit code), or even more secure, an authenticator app is used. This app generates a new code every minute, and the app is accessed with a secure identification pin by you. *If you have the option for an authenticator app, use it*, because the weak point in SMS two factor authentications is your phone....
- 2. Mobile phones: thieves are good at convincing phone companies to port your number to a new service, or that you need a new SIM for your phone and getting it sent to them, the same phone that you may use for the two factor authentication codes. The first you know of any problem is that your phone goes dead and then you have to convince your phone provider that it is in fact a criminal that has been given access to your phone. The ever helpful phone company will then tell you to present at their nearest physical outlet with 100 points of ID. Not very helpful if you live in regional areas where no physical outlets exist. Meanwhile, the thief has access to your texts with the authentication codes. With the price of fuel, no one wants to be driving to Adelaide to get a new SIM card. Talk to your service provider about putting a verbal PIN on your account, whereby a new SIM cannot be issued without that verbal PIN being provided. If you use your phone for email, Paypal, two factor authentication, recording your PINS or Security Passwords (which you shouldn't do) or anything that has links to your financials, MAKE SURE YOU HAVE A SECURITY CODE to open the phone. Otherwise, the first thief who picks it up has open access to everything. A browser search will show up your financial institution, and the ever helpful password manager fills in your account and password whereby the thief then has full access to your funds. Transfer to a crypto wallet as they are untraceable.
- 3. Your credit Freeze it! Either contact the three credit agencies Equifax, Illion and Experian who may charge a fee, or use an app like Credit Savvy for no charge. *Put a ban on your credit file*. This will stop criminals from accessing credit in your name, and destroy your credit rating. If you require credit yourself, you will need to temporarily lift the ban to allow access then put it back in place once your credit application has been assessed.





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# **August is Dental Disease Month!**

#### What is dental disease?

Dental disease occurs when a plaque like substance builds up over teeth in cats and dogs. It most commonly builds up on the outside of the teeth. The plaque is a great environment for bacteria to thrive. This results in bacteria moving to gums and causing inflammation and infections. The bacteria can then travel to tooth roots and causes abscess and even travel through the bloodstream to affect the whole body.

### What are the consequences of dental disease?

It is painful! Dogs and cats express dental pain differently to humans, but a lot of studies have identified that this is a painful disease and should be treated. Other consequences of dental disease are tooth root abscess or bacteria migrating around the body. Mouths have a lot of blood vessels, therefore when bacteria migrate to gums, they also have access to the bloodstream. Persistent bacteria in the bloodstream can result in liver disease, kidney disease and even heart disease, such as heart murmurs.

## Eight signs of dental disease:-

- 1. Constant smelly breath
- 2. Becomes fussy with food, especially hard food such as bones or dry biscuits
- 3. Chews food and then spits out
- 4. Bleeding or very red gums
- 5. Discoloured teeth
- 6. Weight loss
- 7. Pawing at mouth
- 8. Head shy

## Prevention of dental disease:

Prevention of dental disease is easier than treatment. However, prevention cannot cure established dental disease. There are a range of things pet owners can do to prevent. The list provided below is listed from good prevention to the best prevention of dental disease.

- Dry biscuits
- Dental chews (must chew over 15 min to be effective!)
- Specialised dental diet
- Oxy fresh water additive
- Brushing teeth

# Good Best

### Treatment:-

When pets have established dental disease, the best way to treat this is for a dental procedure to be undertaken at a vet clinic. This involves examining each individual tooth and cleaning all teeth so they are in perfect condition. Sometimes teeth may have to be removed if the disease is going to cause longer term issues.
